I beg to report that the above named came under notice some time ago in connection with his association with the German Club at Auckland, and I believe, instructions were issued by the Commissioner that Shmidt's movements were to be noted and a report furnished should be leave to Dominion.

In checking over declarations filed in the Government Statistician's office tofay, I noticed one made by Schmidt on the 12th April, 1938, when he left by the Awatea for Sydney.

The declaration showed his destination as England, but this was erased and Australia substituted.

Schmidt is a director of Pacific Potash Ltd, with offices at Auckland, and I understand he was suspected of being a Nazi agent.

relative to KURT WILHELM SCHMIDT - leaving Auckland shortly on visit to Germany.

I respectfully report further to my report re this man, dated the 10 th August, 1937 (Secret file35/569).

Schmidt is leaving Auckland for Sydney by the "Awatea" on the 11 th April next.. He leaves Sydney by the "Mariposa" on the 29 th April and continues on by that vessel via Auckland, on the 2 nd May.

He travels across the U.S.A. by Greyhound bus and leaves New York for Bremen, Germany, by North German Lloyd steamer.

His tentative arrangements for his return to New Zealand with his wife and family, as stated in my previous report, still stand.

Schmidt remains a fervent Nazi with a complete loyalty to Herr Hitler. However, his activities a complete loyalty to herr filter. however, his activity comtinue to be confined to the German Club and there is no evidence that he is engaged in any activities that are subversive of, or inimical to the laws or well-being of New Zealand. Nevertheless, there is no doubt at all that he would engage in such activities should he at any time be required to do so.

I respectfully report further in connection with German Club and alleged Nazi activities in Auckland.

By Commissioner's Memo dated 28/4/36, (Secret 35/569), I was instructed - "In the event of Schmidt leaving New Zealand for Germany or elsewhere, please have particulars of his booking etc forwarded as early as possible".

I have now ascertained that Mrs Hela Schmidt.wife of Kurt Wilhelm Schmidt, and her two small daughters are booked to leave Auckland by the "Mariposa" for Sydney, on the 3 rd Sept, 1937.. At Sydney, they connect with the "Ctranto", en route to England and Germany.

As previously reported Mrs Schmidt is a fervent Nazi.

Kurt Wilhelm Schmidt is booked to leave Auckland by the "Mariposa" for Europe, via the U.S.A. on the 2 nd May, 1938.

The whole family is provisionally booked to return to New Zealand by the "Rangitane" from London, on the 10 th November, 1938.

Schmidt is going to Germany on his scheduled leave from the firm by which he is employed Pacific Potash Ltd... He last visited Germany in 1934.

Dear Mr. Cummings,

With reference to my telegrams DS/8/41 and DS/56/41 of the 3rd January and 16th January, and to your telegram No. E.45 of the 8th January, regarding Kurt Wilhelm SCHMIDT. John Montgomerie HATTRICK who was born on the 30th September 1877 at Johnstone, Renfrewshire, is a Director of the UNITED POTASH CO. LTD., 112 Fenchurch Street, London, E.C.

This man first came to our notice in 1925 when a certain Major August DIEHN, who is a known German agent and who assisted in fomenting a mutiny in Singapore in 1915, visited this country and contacted HATTRICK in connection with the POTASH business, DIEHN being Director-General of the German POTASH SYNDIGATE.

Nothing more was heard of HATTRICK until 1937 when a German woman, Hela Elsbeth SCHMIDT, wife of the leader of the N.S.D.A.P. Stutzpunkt in Auckland, arrived in this country from Sydney for one week en route for Hamburg, giving as her address UNITED POTASH CO. LTD., 112 Fenchurch Street, E.C. As HATTRICK was in Australia from 1904, when he was carrying on business in Sydney as a dealer in potash fertiliser, until April 1914, and then again from October 1914 until January 1917, there seems some reason for assuming a connection between HATTRICK and SCHMIDT before her arrival in this country.

HATTRICK has recently come to notice again through information received from a Mr. SAYWELL and his wife, Mrs. Jessie SAYWELL, who live at 2a, Adelaide Mansions, 181 Queen's Gate, and who share an air raid shelter with HATTRICK, whose private address is also at 181 Queen's Gate. Mrs. SAYWELL stated that about twenty-five years ago she was on her way to Australia and met HATTRICK on board ship. He was then generally regarded as German on

account of his accent and general manner, and, according to Mrs. SAYWELL, was decidedly pro-German in his outlook.

We have recently been in communication with our representative in Australia regarding HATTRICK, and he informed us that HATTRICK was brought before a military enquiry in 1916 on a suspicion of trading and communicating with the enemy and also evasion of censorship. We have now written to him giving the latest information regarding HATTRICK's activities and asking for further details of his activities in 1916.

As Kurt Wilhelm SCHMIDT is now interned, it seems advisable, in view of recent information, to interrogate him as requested in my cable of 16.1.41. to obtain further information in general about HATTRICK.

A copy of a photograph of HATTRICK is attached for your information.



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



I respectfully report that the result of my interviews with Mrs and Mr Schmidt on the 22 nd and 23 rd ult. was reported by me on the 29 th ult.

Mrs Schmidt is a woman of strong character and she would not think of denying that she is German in her sympathies, first, last and all the time. On thinking over my interview with her she now seems to be sorry that she might have said something that might in some small way assist the British war effort.

I have not interviewed her about the portion of her letter in which she refers to "Lilian", "Vin" and "Eustace" as I can explain this without doing 80.

'Lilian'is Mrs Lilian DONOVAN, 'Vin' is her husband Frederick Vincent DONOVAN and 'Eustace' is their son Eustace Vincent DONOVAN.

The Donovan's rented rooms from the Schmidt's for some years prior to the war. Frederick Vinwent Donovan was a member of the Gefman Club and was one of the committee that finally wound up the affairs of the club ... He was at one time an officer in the British Army and there is no reason to doubt that he and his family are quite loyal.

Since the commencement of the present war Donovan, senr. has been trying to get into the Army here but has been refused, the reason being given him was that he is too old. However, he and his wife are quite convinced that the real reason is that the Army authorities know that he has been a member of the German Club and that he has been friendly for years with known Nazis - that is Schmidt and his wife.

I respectfully report that in accordance with the attached instructions I interviewed Mrs H.E.Schmidt, wife of K.W.Schmidt at her home at 6 Martin Avenue, Remuera at 10 a.m on Wednesdaythe 28 md inst.

Mrs Schmidt answered all questions freely and showed no disposition to hide anything. She betrayed no emotion or surprise at my sudden mention of the name of Hatrick. I should perhaps mention that I have been on quite friendly terms with both Mrs Schmidt and her husband for the past 4 or 5 years. This was brought about by my official interest in the German Club and local Nazis, of which Schmidt was aware.

In agreement with facts which were known and reported at the time Mrs Schmidt said that she and her two children left Auckland for Germany, via Sydney and England on 3.9.37.. Her husband did not leave Auckland until 29.4.38 and he joined his family in Germany in June 1938... While awaiting trans-shipment in Sydney she called at the office of Pacific Potash Ltd there, where she met the manager of that branch - one Gerard de Vahl DAVIS, whom she already knew.. Davis is of British-Jew parentage.

Davis is, said Mrs Schmidt, the step-son of J.M.Hatrick. Davis gave Mrs Schmidt a letter of introduction to Hatrick and she says that that was the sole reason that she subsequently called on Hatrick in London... She says that she saw Hatrick once only; after her arrival in London in October 1937 she 'phoned him at his office and then called to see him there. Hatrick made a luncheon appointment and she was with him about 1 hour.. Also present at the luncheon were GUSSEFELT - the German representative of the company of which Hatrick was Managing-Director and ROEDERER - the French representative... Mrs Schmidt could not remember as the name of the company.

Mrs Schmidt said that she had no particular business with Hatrick, the conversation was very general and no national matters were touched on. She said that Hatrick did not appear to be at all pro-German. She understood him to be British, either English or Scotch. He was a man getting on for 70 years of age... Mrs Schmidt did not again see any of those present at the luncheon or anyong connected with the company. She was in England for 5 days and then left for Germany.

Mrs Schmidt said that Hatrick had a Jewish wife who died in Australia about 3 or 4 years ago when she went there to visit her son G.deV.Davis.

Mrs Schmidt said that Hatrick was in Australia for a few years before the war of 1914-18 and, she thought, in New Zealand also - in connection with potash.

She said that she had heard from her husband that Hatrick, since the present war commenced, was to some extent acting for the British Government in connection with potash and other fertilizers.

She said that GUSSEFELT had been in London for many years; he was a man of about 40 years of age and he seemed to be anti-Nazi.

Mrs Schmidt said that she had not heard of Hatrick before the received the letter of introduction from Davis in Sydney.. She believes Davis to be an English Jew.

I suddenly mentioned to Mrs Schmidt the name of MAJOR AUGUST DIEHN and asked where she had met him. She said "I have not met him but I know the name because he is about the most prominent man in Germany in potash - he is behind all the French-German potash concerns."

She said that Hatrick's business was not connected with Pacific Potash Ltd. The former was also a French-German company so she supposed it had also been declared an enemy company by now.

I questioned her closely and she showed no resentment or national feeling. She was friendly, she appeared frank and I believe that she was so. She said that if it had been anyone else questioning her she would have told them to ask her husband. She said that he probably knew more about Hatrick and his business than she did..

At 11-30 a.m on the 23 rd inst. I saw KURT-WILHELM SCHMIDT at Somes Island, Wellington, where he has been interned since 23.12.39.

He also seemed to be quite frank and showed no tendency to evade questions, though actually few were necessary... I asked him if he knew a man named Hatrick. He said that the only person he knew of that name was in the potash business in London. He said he had met Hatrick on three occasions.

The first was in 1929 when Hatrick visited Berlin in connection with potask and fertilizers and he visited the firm for which Schmidt was working - also in the same connection.

The second occasion was in November-December 1929 when Schmidt was sent by his firm to London for 4 weeks to work in the office of Dominion Potash Supply Ltd with the object of gaining a knowledge of the Australian and New Zealand market. Hatrick was the owner of this business and at the same time he was the Managing-Director of United Potash Co.Ltd, London, having been so appointed about 1925. This was a Franco-British potash distributing concern... Hatrick's own business Dominion Potash Supply Ltd. was wound up about 1931 in agreement with Franco-German concerns.

Third occasion Schmidt met Hatrick was about November 1938 in London, when Schmidt and his family were in London on their way back to New Zealand.

Schmidt said that all these three meetings with Hatrick were merely business ones in connection with the potash industry. He said that so far as he knows Hatrick was an ordinary British business man, not anti-British and "not particularly pro-German".

Schmidt said that Hatrick was a man of about 70 years of age and quite awell-known personality in England and he understood that Hatrick had an estate in Scotland. Schmidt said that he had heard through Pacific Potash Ltd. (before his internment) that after the present war commenced Hatrick had got permission from the English Government to buy potash supplies where he could get them. It was hoped to get some from Spain and Palastine. He had also heard that Hatrick had been appointed in an advisory capacity to the British Government.

Schmidt said that he believed that Hatrick was in Australia and New Zealand for a period of perhaps 4 or 5 years before the last war.

Schmidt said that he has no doubt that from London Hatrick would frequently visit Paris, Berlin and Mulhouse (Alsace-Lorraine), the centre of the Franco-German potash industry.

I mentioned the name of MAJOR AUGUST DIEHN suddenly to Schmidt. He showed no surprise and said that he had never met him but he knew the name well as a person very prominent in the German Potash Syndicate. He said he was in the German Economic Ministry just before the war commenced.

Schmidt then told me of Mrs Schmidt's meeting with Hatrick. This was what his wife had told him and what she had previously told me.

Schmidt said that Hatrick would be in close touch with all fertilizer and chemical concerns in Europe and also with Imperial Chemicals Industries.

Hatrick is undoubtedly a wealthy man, said Schmidt; he first went to Australia before the last war as an adviser to the German Government on potash, and he laid the foundations in Australia and New Zealand for the potash industry.

Schmidt said that in New Zealand Hatrick knew MR.C.A.WILKINSON, (M.P. for Egmont) and a MR.J.PATERSON, of Paterson & Robertson, Commission Agents and Indentors, of Auckland.

Regarding the third paragraph of the attached copy of bablegram received from a secret source in which the word "animosity" appears. This word does not appear to make sense and it seems to me that the word should read "ostensible" or something similar. However, I questioned both Mr and Mrs Schmidt as though the word were actually "animosity". They both stated that there was no animosity or ill-feeling or quarrel between them respectively and Hatrick.

On my return to Auckland I interviewed on the 25 th inst. one MR LEITH NAPIER. This man is an Australian and served in the A.I.F. in the Great War. There is no reason to doubt that he is other than a loyal British subject... I have known for some years that NAPIER was formerly the manager of Pacific Potash Ltd. in Auckland. Schmidt was dignified by the title of Deputy Manager. However, I have previously reported Schmidt seemed to do very little work and actually his job was a sort of watch dog for the firm's German interests. He more or less kept an eye on Napier and to my knowledge there had never been any love lost between the two.

Of course, there is little doubt also that Schmidt was in some way an agent for the Nazi Government.

I think it was in August 1940 that Pacific Potash Ltd. was declared an enemy company.

Napier also knows Hatrick and has met him on two or three occasions, the last being in 1936. He said that he understands that Hatrick is a native of Scotland, of a German Mother and a Scotch father.

He also, said that Hatrick lived in Sydney prior to 1914, that he was then in sole charge of the industry, which was then purely German. That is, the potash industry in Australia.

Napier said that Hatrick is now in co-charge with a Frenchman named A.LEBELLE of the firm of Potash Ltd, Fenton House, 112 Fenchurch St, London. He said that Hatrick is a man of very considerable means and that he also makes a large sum annually in Insurance broking... He also said that Hatrick is attached to the Ministry of Supply in England in connection with potash.

Napier said that he had heard somewhere that Hatrick had been educated in Germany

Napier said that Major Diehn had frequently been in Australia and that at some period (probably prior to the last war) he was in charge of German shipping interests in Singapore and Shanghai.

Napier could tell me nothing definite to indicate that Hatrick should now be viewed with suspicion but he gave it as his opinion that Hatrick is a man worth watching as being likely to be both pro-German and pro-Nazi... Napier knew that Hatrick had come under suspicion in Australia after the commencement of the last war.

On the 28 th inst. I saw MR JAMES PATERSON referred to on page 3 of this report. He has been a business man in Auckland for many years and there is no doubt he is a loyal British subject.

He told me that he knows Hatrick and has met him on several occasions since about 1910. He first met him through the potash industry when Hatrick came to Auckland from Australia. Potash in this part of the world was then being handled by a German firm in Sydney named LOHMANN & CO. Mr Paterson became the agent here for potash distributed by that firm. He said that he last met Hatrick when he (Hatrick) came to New Zealand about 1930.

Patersom said that Hatrick is a man in his sixties. He believes that Hatrick was born at his parent's home at a place called Johnston, Renfrewshire, Scotland. He believes that both parents were Scotch. He said that Hatrick speaks fluent German and that he has been associated with Germans since he was about 25 years of age. He studied agriculture and gained some Diploma of Agriculture which led to him getting some position in Germany with a German firm, in connection with potash and other fertilizers... Paterson said that he could think of no reason to suspect Hatrick of any German associations of an anti-British nature.

Paterson also said that Hatrick had a close business connection with a man named THOMAS (surname) a German in the potash industry in Germany.
